
Celebrate International Women's Day: "12 Women Who Changed the World: Untold Stories"

World Women and Feminist Perspectives,"



Faculty Awards & Recognitions

Discover new perspectives on the aging process and dementia within Mexican and U.S. Latino communities in Professor <u>Flávia Andrade</u>'s latest <u>co-edited book</u>, a culmination of insights from the International Conference on Aging in the Americas. <u>This vital resource</u> delves into the critical challenges and consequences arising from the swift aging of these populations. Dr. Andrade, alongside her collaborative team, offers an in-depth analysis of how rapid demographic shifts affect families, labor markets, and healthcare systems. The book serves as an essential guide for understanding the complex dynamics at play, providing valuable



information for researchers, policymakers, and healthcare professionals focused on addressing the unique needs of aging Latino populations.


Dr. Angharad N. Valdivia, Knapp Chair of Liberal Arts at the University of San Diego, offered a comprehensive analysis of the evolving representation of Latina girl culture in U.S. popular culture. The event took place on Wednesday, February 21 at 5:30 p.m. in Warren Auditorium at the University of San Diego. Dr. Valdivia traced the progression from the pioneering character Dora the Explorer on Nickelodeon to the Latina heroines in the latest Barbie movie, examining their significant roles in elevating Latinas and Latinidad in media visibility and commercial prominence. Her engaging



discussion underscored the dynamic presence and influence of Latina characters in the media landscape. <u>Check out this link for more information</u>.

On February 01, 2024 - Dr. Ryan Wade, professor at the School of Social Work and the WGGP affiliate, published a study titled "Whose Role is It Anyway? Sexual Racism and Sexual Positioning Among Young Sexual Minority Black Men" in the Journal of Sex Research, offering unprecedented insights into the dynamics of sexual racism. The research focuses on the challenges of Racialized Sexual Discrimination (RSD), or "sexual racism," particularly affecting young sexual minority Black men (YSMBM). Despite increased awareness, the intersection of RSD with sexual positioning roles among YSMBM has remained underexplored. Dr. Wade's

research fills this critical gap through an in-depth analysis of survey data from 726 participants, illuminating the complex realities of sexual racism faced by this group. Here, you can read more about the study.





On February 10, 2024 - In a CNN piece, "Why This Year's Super Bowl Is All About the Bathrooms," Dr. <u>Kathryn Anthony</u>, WGGP Faculty Affiliate, provided expert insight into the crucial issue of "potty parity" within stadium design. Her commentary highlights the need for equitable restroom experiences in large venues, emphasizing the importance of thoughtful architecture in public spaces. This accolade is part of the 2024 Architectural Education Awards, recognizing outstanding contributions in building design, community engagement, research, and service by architectural educators.
