Dr. Helga Varden, Professor of Philosophy at Illinois and WGGP Faculty Affiliate, has written an article titled "How to Move Beyond Our Endless Disagreements over Abortion Policies," which proposes a Kantian solution to the seemingly insoluble moral conflict surrounding abortion. The article examines the complexities of the abortion debate in the United States. It highlights the problem with the current focus on when life begins, arguing that legal discussions about abortion should not be based on personal beliefs but on a legal conception of personhood. The article

references philosophical perspectives, particularly Kantian theory, to suggest a shift in focus from deeply personal convictions to legal justifications for abortion, thereby enabling the formulation of unifying and justifiable abortion laws. To read the article <u>check out this link</u>.

Insights from a Former Fellow: An Interview with Dr. Ananya Tiwari on Winning the WGGP Fellowships

Dr. Ananya Tiwari, an assistant professor in Educational Psychology and ACES faculty fellow, focuses on the intersection of educational psychology, cross-cultural psychology, and evaluation. Her work emphasizes the sense of belonging, social and emotional development, educational technology, artificial intelligence, and international development. She explores how identities, social structures, and experiences influence the sense of belonging among marginalized communities and evaluates



the impact of policies and programs aimed at enhancing this belonging. Previously, as a GRID student, Dr. Tiwari was honored with two WGGP Fellowships, recognizing her contributions and potential in her field of study.

This Wednesday, we celebrated Carolyn Tomchik.

Carolyn's academic path is a testament to her dedication and excellence. She earned all her degrees from the Department of Nuclear, Plasma, and Radiological Engineering: a Bachelor of Science in 2005, a Master of Science in 2011, and a Ph.D. in 2016. Carolyn's involvement extended far beyond the classroom during her time as a student. She was an active member of the Engineering Council, took on key roles in the Student Branch of the American Nuclear Society, and participated in numerous student service activities. Her leadership skills were recognized when she was elected to the Knights of St. Patrick, the highest honor for leadership among engineering undergraduates. She eventually rose to become the Director of this group. Carolyn's graduate years were marked by several distinguished honors, highlighting her academic prowess and commitment to her field. She received the Nuclear Regulatory Commission Fellowship, the U.S. Department of Energy Nuclear Engineering/Health Physics Fellowship, and the Carver Fellowship. Carolyn Tomchik stands as an exemplary figure, embodying the highest academic standards while fervently working to enhance the experiences and opportunities for her peers and making significant contributions to the stature of the Department, College, and University.
