WGGP Faculty Affiliate and Director of the Humanities Research Institute Antoinette Burton has been selected to participate in the 2023–24 cohort of the University of Illinois System Public Voices Fellowship. The fellowship is a unique opportunity led by The OpEd Project which is part of a national initiative to help faculty amplify their expertise in ways that can contribute to public conversations about pressing issues.

Antoinette is part of a cohort of 20 faculty members who will attend four sessions held during the 2023–24 academic year and will be paired with a journalism mentor who provides one-on-one editing and coaching, with the goal of publishing two or more op-ed pieces during the program.

### **WGGP Event: In Focus**

As part of the IGI series 'China and the World', WGGP hosted Lü Pin, a PhD student in political science at Rutgers University to talk about "Resilience Amidst Repression: The Chinese Feminist Movement in the Era of Escalating Authoritarianism." In 2009 in China, Lü Pin and colleagues organized Feminist Voices, a social media platform that aimed to call attention to a lack of women's rights in their country. Because of growing pressure against the group by the Chinese government, Lü Pin relocated to the U.S. in 2015 and when Feminist Voices was ultimately banned in 2018, she turned her attention to organizing women in the diaspora to create a national feminist network.



Lü Pin noted that even when the government used its power to jail activists, shut down media sites, and stigmatize the women's rights movement, "women can transfer inaction into action" by refusing to conform to stereotyped gender roles and rejecting predetermined life choices. #### **Women in History Wednesday**

Every week WGGP celebrates accomplishments of women associated with the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. These series are part of the 150 for 150 website that was was created by the Gender Equity Council and the University Library to highlight women who have made significant achievements during their time at the University either as students, staff, faculty, or alumni.

This Wednesday we celebrated Reshma Saujani who graduated from the University of Illinois in 1997 with a Bachelor of Arts in

Political Science and Speech Communication. She was the founder of the organization Girls Who Code, started in 2012. She is also the first Indian American woman and the first South Asian American woman to run for Congress. In 2015, Fortune magazine named Reshma to their "40 Under 40" list.

## **Campus-wide Funding and other Opportunities**

2024-25 HRI Fellowships: "Think Again..."

HRI grants fellowships to Illinois faculty and graduate students, who spend the year engaged in research and writing. Faculty fellows are provided with one semester of release time and research funds. Graduate student fellows are given a stipend and a tuition and partial fee waiver for the academic year of the award. The theme for 2024–25 fellowship year will be "Think Again..."

# **Mellon/ACLS Dissertation**

Fellowships support graduate students in the humanities and social sciences who show promise of leading their fields in important

new directions. The fellowships are designed to intervene at the formative stage of dissertation development, before research and writing are advanced.

The total award includes a \$40,000 stipend for the fellowship year, as well as up to \$3,000 for research and travel, and up to \$5,000 in professional development funds to support skills acquisition or additional research to support innovative/expansive directions. An additional \$2,000 is available as a stipend for the external mentor. The deadline to apply is **October 25<sup>th</sup>**, 2023. For more details, visit the Mellon/ACLS website.

#### American Association of University Women (AAUW) Scholarships

The AAUW offers a range of scholarships to domestic and international women students to pursue their academic research or community-based projects. The International Fellowship <u>Program</u> provides support for women pursuing full-time graduate or postdoctoral study in the United States to women who are not U.S. citizens or permanent residents, and who intend to return to their home country to pursue a professional career. Opportunities for domestic students range from dissertation completion fellowships to community action grants. The deadline to apply is **November**, **15th**. ### **Organize & Analyze: Social Movements Reading Group**

Join a multi-disciplinary reading group on social movements. This reading group focuses on global working-class social movements. We will begin with theories of social movements to develop a shared vocabulary, then delve into movement history and analyses of contemporary struggles. We plan to meet biweekly to discuss a range of both theoretical and empirical texts alongside cultural expressions of movements via short stories, plays, and poems. We hope our readings and discussions will inform our intellectual development, political education, and praxis.
