Corruption as Freedom:
The Different Ways that Petty Economic Crime Undermines Autocracy

Noon, CST September 7, 2022 3057 Lincoln Hall

Speaker: **Marina Zaloznaya**Associate Professor, University of Iowa

Abstract: In the Global North, corruption is considered incompatible with civic health – scholars argue that it decreases social trust, atomizes communities, and discourages active citizenship. By contrast, my research in authoritarian regimes reveals that, for ordinary citizens, engagement in public sector corruption is linked to more active participation in the political life. In this talk, I will explore the mechanisms whereby extorted and voluntary bribery exchanges are connected to civic activism, drawing on national representative surveys from Russia (2015 and 2018) and China (2018). 

Due Date Catalog: A New Resource for Student Success

Last year ATLAS released an application called <u>DateCat</u> (or Due Date Catalog) to help students keep track of due dates for courses in Moodle, Compass, and Canvas. DateCat automatically merges assignments and due dates from these LMS systems into one



calendar and can be used as an effective tool for students to remain organized during the semester.

This year ATLAS has added the functionality for faculty NOT using an LMS to directly input due dates into DateCat. Faculty and instructors assigned to a course in Banner can log in to add their due dates directly to DateCat or to view information pulled from Moodle or Canvas for their classes.


